Acanthodactylus cantoris Günther, 1864 Indian Fringe-toed Lizard

Global range: Afghanistan, India, Iran, Jordan, and Pakistan.

Distribution in Iran: Sistan and Baluchestan Province.

Biology: Indian Fringe-toed Lizards live in deserts and in sandy habitats covered with shrubs. This species can be found in areas with or with-



out vegetation. For instance, specimens were seen in a dry stream with dense vegetation of *Phragmites* near Iranshahr.

Size: Snout-vent length 70 mm, tail length 60 mm.

Reproduction: Oviparous.
